

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK. . .

I normally try to come up with something inspirational or at least theological for you to ponder in my monthly articles. This month, I thought I'd do something a little different.

As you read this, over 850 delegates from around the world are meeting in North Carolina for the United Methodist Church General Conference to decide matters of church law. These conferences happen every four years and serve as the ONLY place where official matters of our denomination's official laws, policies, and procedures are debated and decided upon. Whereas we meet every year in our Annual Conference to vote on things relating to our local church operations, it is at the General Conference where the official stances of the denomination as a whole are decided.

This General Conference has actually been eight years in the making instead of the usual four. The last planned meeting in 2020 was postponed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Two additional attempts, in 2021 and 2022, were also cancelled before they could happen due to continuing travel and health concerns by some of the delegates. So, the last General Conference actually happened in May of 2016.

A lot has happened since May of 2016. In the US alone, we have had two presidential elections. There have been some major changes to policies and laws in our political and social spheres. And, in our own local Annual Conference, over half of our United Methodist Churches have chosen to disaffiliate from the denomination and either join a different denomination or become independent. This particular trend hasn't been quite as pronounced in other areas of the country, but it still has taken its toll on our numbers. Nationwide, approximately 25% of local churches have left the United Methodist Church. In other parts of the world, United Methodist Churches are raising questions of autonomy, local church influence, and how the church should conform to or fight against changing societal norms.

What this means is that the delegates who would have been present in 2020 to make decisions for the Church are not necessarily the same delegates who are meeting right now. The delegates who are representing the clergy and the laity of the church may have different ideas on the direction the church should take than the delegates originally selected to attend the meeting IN 2020. And, with more on the line concerning the outcomes of their decisions, it almost certainly means that it will be even more difficult for the delegates to set aside personal agendas and seek and move with the Holy Spirit's guidance because each delegate now has a much deeper personal interest in the outcome of the conversations. It will be much more tempting (and much easier than in previous conferences) for the personal will of the delegates to take precedence over the will of the body and, dare I say, the Will of God.

I don't mean to sound pessimistic. I have great respect for the processes we have set up as a denomination. But I also feel that we have to muster as much prayer coverage as we possibly can for the discussions and the decisions arising at this conference. Just as we must constantly pray for our political leaders, now, more than ever, we need to be in prayer for our church leaders.

The decisions that these delegates make will affect things like: apportionments (as the number of conferences and bishops may change), church procedure and policy on property ownership, methods available for churches who wish to disaffiliate, United Methodist relations with other denominations (which could further influence our stances on some issues), and our official church law and stances on some of the issues that have been dividing us as a denomination for years.

My ask of you during this time of General Conference is simply that you pray for God to lead our denomination into its next season. And, I believe the best way to do that is with one simple line from The Lord's Prayer:

"Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done on Earth as it is in Heaven...Amen"

May's Birthstone - If you were born in May then your birthstone is the vibrant deep green emerald. Emeralds have the same green shade as a thriving spring garden, and in French, the name for emerald is *jardin*, literally the French word for garden. May's Birth Flower - We think one of the best things about the month of May is the blooming of spring flowers. The official birthday flower of May is the delicate and fragrant lily of the valley.
