FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK. . .

Easter has come. No matter how hard we (OK, I) try to stop it, it always comes around. It is a stressful time for me, and, I suspect, for many of you. I have services to plan and speakers to invite. I feel the pressure to teach and preach the most familiar story in the Bible in a new way each year. Not only do you have family plans to make, kids' and grandkids' Easter festivities to attend, and meals to cook, but you also find ways to stay engaged in ministry. You set up the Sanctuary for Stations of the Cross. You prepare meals, not just for your family, but for church luncheons. You bake bread and help serve communion 3 times in 10 days. You practice and perform Cantatas and special music. You take food to the Wesley Foundation at SHSU.

It. Is. EXHAUSTING.

And, now that the highest of Holy Days in all of Christendom has passed, it would be easy to give into the temptation to sit back, rest, and leave all of this Jesus-y resurrection stuff behind us. It would be easy to leave Jesus behind and not really worry about him again until Christmas.

But, that's not how Jesus works. And that's not how we work as Christians.

You see, Easter isn't just a day. Easter is actually an entire season in the Christian calendar. The Season of Easter or Eastertide, often called The Great Fifty Days, is an entire season of celebration. The resurrection isn't just celebrated for ONE day. It is celebrated for an entire liturgical season. From Easter Sunday until the Day of Pentecost, our focus is on the resurrection of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Why dedicate an entire season and not just one day to the resurrection? I mean, Jesus was only resurrection one time on one day, right?

We celebrate the resurrection because it is THE MOST DEFINING MOMENT in human history. It is the miracle of the resurrection that sets Jesus apart. It is our belief in the resurrection that sets Christianity apart from other religions. We do not have a death place or a final resting place to which we can journey and pay our respects because THE TOMB WAS EMPTY.

In our church, every Sunday we recite the Apostle's Creed. It states, in part, "I believe...in Jesus Christ, his only son, our Lord, who was...crucified dead and buried. The third day HE ROSE FROM THE DEAD, ASCENDED INTO HEAVEN, and sitteth at the right hand of God, the Father Almighty. I believe in...the resurrection of the body and the life everlasting." We proclaim every single week as an act of worship that we believe that the physical body of Jesus was resurrected from the dead and ascended into heaven. We state that we believe that one day our bodies will be resurrected and the we will join him in everlasting life.

That is a HUGE statement to make. We are saying that we believe that our God and our Savior are so mighty that even death is not the final act. We believe that Jesus was resurrected and that we will be one day, as well.

I would argue that the resurrection is bigger than just one day's celebration. I would argue it deserves even more than 50 Days of liturgical season. I would argue that belief in the resurrection is worthy of our devotion every day of our lives.



A TIME 2 READ... is a dedicated literacy program directed at supporting public school students in Huntsville ISD. This program specifically targets second grade students, identified by the school district, who are struggling with reading.

In the program, trained community volunteers tutor these identified students on a regular weekly basis throughout the school year. YOU CAN BE A VOLUNTEER by contacting: Holly McMichael, Executive Director, A Time 2 Read by email: HOLLY@ATIME2READ.org or by calling 936-577-2516.

In 2023, Harvard's Center for Education Policy Research and Stanford's Education Opportunity Project released study results from 3,760 districts across the nation regarding reading growth for the COVID period 2019-2022. Huntsville ISD was recognized by the study for earning the highest gains in reading levels in the study group for 3rd-8th graders. The study results indicated that — students across the nation lost almost a quarter of a year in reading ability during this period. Huntsville ISD was the only district in the study to show more than a full year's growth. The district recognized A Time 2 Read program as being an instrumental piece in Huntsville ISD receiving this recognition.

Studies suggest that students who read as few as six books over the summer maintain the level of reading skills they achieved during the preceding school year. These studies also indicated that young readers who don't continue to read over the summer, especially those who are reluctant or at-risk, are likely to lose crucial ground. One summer off can mean a whole school year of struggling academis performance. (www.scholastic.com/teachers/articles/teaching-content/bridging-summer-reading-gap)

Consequently, A Time 2 Read provides summer backpacks for identified students.
